14. 2018 NEIGHBORHOOD TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT PROGRAM ANNUAL REPORT

Public Works Director Leja presented the annual report and said Loise Street, Severin Drive, Garfield Drive, Lemon Avenue (Garfield to Wood), El Paso Street, Lemon Avenue (Schuyler and Grant), and Paula Street had been added to the 2018 ranked list of streets requesting traffic calming. Mr. Leja also discussed the Phase 1, 2 and 3 traffic calming projects and reviewed the recommendations for each street. In addition, Public Works Director Leja discussed the streets

being monitored following traffic calming. Mr. Leja reviewed the Traffic Commission and staff recommendations for clarifications and changes to the Neighborhood Traffic Management Program

A discussion ensued between Council and staff regarding enforcing traffic calming installations, the classification of arterial streets, the purpose of the Neighborhood Traffic Management Program Annual Report and Work Plan, the criterion of Quadrant IV, the process of the Neighborhood Traffic Management Program Work Plan, the process for installing stop signs, the addition of Sacramento Drive to the Neighborhood Traffic Management Program Work Plan, the purpose of including adjacent streets in the petition voting process when speed humps are selected, and the public requests to increase the residential voting threshold for speed humps or speed tables to 67% and to increase the 85th percentile speed criteria from 7mph to 10mph over the designated speed limit.

June Tuttle, resident, submitted a written statement requesting the Council approve to increase the residential voting threshold for speed humps or speed tables from 50%+1 to 67% and to include adjacent streets in the petition voting process when speed humps are selected.
